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Chronic Absenteeism in Hartford Public Schools


Background

A student is defined as chronically absent if they miss 10% or more of school days in a given year. This report uses chronic absenteeism data for students in the Hartford Public Schools (HPS), available from the Connecticut State Department of Education (CSDE), through http://edsight.ct.gov. Note that unless otherwise specified, the data reflects chronic absenteeism for Kindergarten through Grade 12.

The Data

Overall Rates in Hartford and Connecticut

The chronic absenteeism rate for the state has been holding steady in the realm of 10% for several years. The rate for Hartford Public Schools has fluctuated a bit more over the same period, but has averaged approximately 24%, which is astonishingly high, even when compared against peer school districts in the state.



The difference between the two lines on that graph might not look particularly dramatic, but that's just because the graphs in this report use a scale that goes up to 100%, and the highest value represented is 26.6%. As you can see from the data table included beneath the graph, the chronic absenteeism rate in Hartford is around 2.5 times as high as the overall rate for the state of Connecticut.

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Chronic Absenteeism Across the State

At Achieve Hartford, we have a standard set of 13 districts we like to use for these comparisons. In this case, they can be broken up into four groups.

Group 1 includes West Hartford, Farmington, and Glastonbury, which all have consistently lower rates of chronic absenteeism than the state at large. Group 2 consists of Stamford, Jumoke Academy, and Achievement First Hartford Academy, which have fluctuated, but which are basically average for Connecticut. Group 3 (CREC and East Hartford) is doing somewhat worse, with 5-year averages in the realm of 15%.

Group 4 (Hartford, New Britain, New Haven, Bridgeport, Manchester, and Waterbury) is doing *much* worse.


But to group Hartford with those districts almost obscures the degree of the problem. In fact, the chronic absenteeism problem in Hartford is so acute, that there are only 5 districts in the state performing worse (see Appendix A for data on the highest rates of chronic absenteeism). Three of the five are individual charter high schools which are legally defined as districts; the fourth is a regional district; and the fifth is Unified School District #1, which serves individuals incarcerated by the Connecticut Department of Corrections.

If one considers only traditional school districts, Hartford Public Schools consistently holds the dubious honor of being #1 in chronic absenteeism. The districts listed above as Group 4 are all among the fifteen districts in the state with the highest rates of chronic absenteeism (see Appendix A), and yet they are all still doing *markedly better* than Hartford Public Schools. What exactly is going on?

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Chronic Absenteeism in High School

Put simply, the difference is encapsulated by what's going on at our neighborhood high schools, all seven of which have been posting the highest rates of chronic absenteeism in the district for several years running.



While several other schools in Hartford have high rates of absenteeism (see Appendix B for detail), these are the ones that are pulling the rate upward. It is important to note that this phenomenon is not exclusive to Hartford; statewide, chronic absenteeism rates are consistently much higher among high school students, as you can see in the table below.

This makes the five districts with higher rates of chronic absenteeism than Hartford (Appendix A) even more alarming; critically, all five serve grades 9-12 either exclusively or overwhelmingly.



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Conclusions

The rates of chronic absenteeism at the seven neighborhood high schools are not just high; they are the highest rates in a district which has among the highest rates in the state. Many of our other schools are doing poorly, but those results are more in line with the rates seen above at comparable Alliance Districts with otherwise similar outcomes, challenges, and demographics. These seven high schools are what set us apart, and the source of our exceptionally high rate of chronic absenteeism.

It is on those schools that resources must be focused to solve this problem. Based on this data, we suspect the district is not prepared to do it alone, and we look forward to seeing a coordinated city-wide effort.

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APPENDIX A: Chronic Absenteeism in Connecticut

Below are the 15 districts in Connecticut with the highest rates of chronic absenteeism. Note that all of the districts included as Group 4 in the district comparison above fall within this range. They are also all Alliance Districts, as is Ansonia School District.

As noted in the main text of this report, all five of the districts with the highest rates of chronic absenteeism exclusively or overwhelmingly serve students in grades 9-12, who have elevated rates of chronic absenteeism across the board. The top three are individual charter high schools, each of which is designed specifically to re-engage disengaged youth. The fourth is a regional district, and the fifth serves individuals incarcerated by the Connecticut Department of Corrections.
